Forms of evaluation

Formative course evaluations were conducted informally throughout the course. The summative evaluation was conducted in the form of a questionnaire at the last seminar. To the students not present the questions were shared through canvas.

Summary of the students' course evaluations

It was stated that 'The study groups were not fully effective in the learning experience.'

Regarding forms of assessment it was written 'We find the assessment to the appropriate and good for the readings involved and overall course format.'

About the added workshops these were appreciated and one student wrote 'The workshops were good and appreciated. The format worked well to allow people to speak openly and freely.'

A frequent opinion that is usually recurring is the desire for more lectures and one student stated 'There was a little too much self-study, in which it felt that learning was not fully optimised.'

Overall, the expectations of the course were considered met.

Summary of the evaluations of the teaching team

Analysis

Success:

The content and execution of the course were overall appreciated, especially the workshops and forms of assessment.

18 students submitted the assignment and many performed well, only two failed.

Problems:

Some students wanted more lectures, and the study groups were not always functioning well.
