Formative course evaluations were conducted informally throughout the course. The summative evaluation was conducted in the form of a survey.

Only five students answered the evaluation, but we (the teachers) received positive feedback from the students throughout the course, where especially the discussions and democratic teaching were emphasised. This is also expressed in the survey.

Analysis

Success:

The content and execution of the course were overall appreciated, especially the way the discussions were guided, with room for everyone to make their voice heard. The oral presentation for Exam 1 was a new form of assessment, and it worked well.

Problems:

Students expressed concern that they could not choose a topic of their own interest for the final exam. There was also the problem of regular attendance in the course activities and many late arrivals.

Action plan

Open for students to start writing on Exam 2 already at the beginning of the course, with more options of interest, or have the choice to answer essay questions at the end.
