Summary of the students' oral and written feedback:

- more instructions and details needed for conduct during debate sessions
- more feedback after debate
- easy communication with teachers and professional teachers during role play
- role play was fun and a good opportunity to learn skills of debating and negotiating in a global arena setting
- valuable lectures but these were too few

Summary of the teacher's views:

- the structure of the debate oral examinations are under constant review. How to better structure the long days of role play.
- Examinations for seminars during module 1 is also under review. How to stimulate students to come to different seminars as these are important for module 2 role play
- instructions for debate sessions and role play can be improved

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- No need to adjust the role play and its preparations. The purpose of module 2 is to follow
 the agenda and work structure of a real international body and the simulation is therefore
 structured to enhance students' skills in understanding the work of the UN.
- Allocation of money/budget to more teaching hours, and a larger course budget would
 make more teaching available. Especially module 1 with its theoretical approach to the UN
 and role play would benefit from a more extensive course budget. The performance of the
 role play in module 2 is dependent on the studies invested during module 1.
