30 students finished the course so far, 10 with an A, 12 with a B, 6 with a C, one with a D and one with a C. So the results are fine in themselves, just looking at grades and how many completed the course.

#### Analysis and action plan (To be completed by the course coordinator)

A major and recurring challenge of this course is the amount of supervision, and the need for external supervisors, meaning a lot of coordination within and in a way outside of the programme. The teachers permanently tied to the programme do not have nearly enough hours to do all the supervision and grading. This problem only intensifies since the teacher who has for long been responsible for the thesis course has now moved on to another university. This will require further discussion between the programme and the department.

This will mean that even more emphasis has to be given to coordination. The grading process involves several steps and several actors for these steps, meaning that some delays are always inevitable. A problem related to this the lack of a back-up plan for grading when the course coordinator is on vacation. Ideally there should be some kind of plan where several people can finalize grades so the system can function more smoothly.
