Of course certain conclusions cannot be drawn from one survey with a limited sample of respondents. However, it makes sense that there is room for improvement of the two latter modules, since these are the most connected to the problem of the teachers permanently tied to the programme not having enough hours to cover all the teaching at the programme, which requires engaging external teachers (who might vary from year to year). Even apart from that problem, the basic aim of having method and paper modules covering three different methodological perspectives would still be a very difficult challenge.
