Based on a scale ranging from 1 to 6, where 6 indicates "to a very large extent," students reported the following:

- They experience achievine learning objectives of the course (mean: 4.1).
- The learning activities supported their learning (mean: 4.2).
- The assessments provided opportunities to demonstrate their learning (mean: 3.6).
- The course enabled them to take responsibility for their own learning (mean: 4.9).



The extent to which the course met their expectations received a mean score of 3.6.

In the written feedback, students emphasized that the lecturers delivered engaging lectures and seminars. Many appreciated the interactive elements provided by the teachers. Some students requested more practical tools and methods for applying equality theories. Concerns were raised regarding the examinations, which reflects students new adaptation to oral forms of examination.

In general, students seem satisfied with the course content and the delivery of the course. Using oral examination is a new experience for many students and for some this type of formats create discomfort. From a teacher perspective, however, the oral examinations is regardes as benefical for students learning and a valuable complement to other individual and group-based written assignment provided at the same course.
