In the free text answers the students want more lectures and more reading material

In the free text answers one students criticise the group works. One praises the structure. One is very critical of the seminars.

In the free text answers one students is very critical of the seminars, others are very positive to the examinations forms.

1. Are there any aspects of the course that you have particularly appreciated?

In the free text answers almost all of the different aspects of the course are mentioned, with an extra emphasis on the guest lecturers.

2. Are there any aspects of the course you think can be improved?

In the free text answers, students express that they want more individual feedback on assignments and in some instances clearer instructions. There is also some issues with individual students being able to dominate the seminar in some instances.

6. To what extent do you think that the course in its entirety has fulfilled your expectations? Mean 4,5

In the free text answers one students argue for more lectures and more time to go in depth on the key concepts.

7. To what extent do you think that the course has given you possibilities to take responsibility for your own learning?

Mean 5,6

In the free text answers the high score contrast to some statements from students wanting more hours with the teachers. Some argue for a stronger connection between abstract concepts and practical applications/examples.

The students seem overall to be content, the critique and praise point in very different directions and we have tried to have varied learning activities which perhaps is reflected in this. Some student point to the seminars being vulnerable to individual students misbehaving and/or taking up to much space, this is a specific problem also addressed during the course and for the next year we will be more attentive to such behavior earlier. Instructions for all assignments will be checked for clarity.

In discussions with student representatives in the program meetings some voiced that there is room for improvement of the "learning notes" exercise.
